Subject: 2021 APTA Legislative Conference

On May 18, 2021, I participated in the virtual American Public Transportation Association (APTA) Legislative Conference. Sessions I attended included the following:

- **Fireside chat with US DOT Secretary Pete Buttigieg:** public transit is a priority for the Biden Administration, part of his "Build Back Better", as demonstrated in the American Rescue Plan and the American Jobs Plan. Strategic priorities for the Administration: climate change and equity; public transit can help meet both objectives. He noted that growing transit's share of travel is key to climate, equity, and strong economy.

On May 19, APTA arranged "virtual fly-in" meetings with elected officials for participants in the APTA Legislative conference. I attended the following meetings:

- Rep. Jimmy Panetta: staff Hillary Marston, Legislative Assistant
 - This was an intimate meeting with Hillary, Alex Clifford (SC Metro CEO), Aaron Quigley (VTA Govt Affairs), and me.
 - We thanked Hillary for her help in submitting our projects for the transportation authorization bill (all 3 agencies' requests were meant for appropriations, but Rep.
 Panetta submitted them all for authorization instead, due to the amounts requested).
 - We asked her to extend our gratitude to Rep. Panetta for the COVID relief funding for transit operations.
 - I spoke about the FTA small starts grant application for the MST SURF! Project and mentioned we may be seeking federal funds for the next phases of the rail program.
 Hillary said Rep. Panetta would be happy to send support letters for both projects.
 - Aaron spoke about the BART extension to San Jose project, which is in the Federal Transit Administration's expedited pilot program for a federal share of \$1.7 billion of the total project cost estimate of \$6.9 billion.
 - Aaron also mentioned that VTA is seeking federal funds for an express bus to Gilroy.
 - Alex noted that thanks to the COVID relief funds, SC Metro managed to avoid layoffs and used creative strategies to keep everyone employed.

- Alex noted the zero-emission bus implementation needs to be phased in as tech evolves and ranges increase – SC Metro still needs CNG buses to meet the clean air mandate, and has a federally-funded CNG facility that hasn't reached the end of its life. He noted Panetta's green bus tax credit bill (HR 583) would help.
- SC Metro will apply for bus and bus facilities grant for paratransit facility and for a RAISE grant for a south county bus division in Watsonville.
- Sen. Alejandro (Alex) Padilla: staff Zac Commins, Policy Advisor
 - This was the largest meeting with 37 participants. APTA-designated leads were Diana Kotler (Anaheim transit), Joel Young (AC Transit) and Alva Carrasco (Latinos in Transit).
 - Key topics were focused on transit jobs; COVID funds for operations critical to keep buses on streets transporting essential workers; transit now needs capital funds for state of good repair projects and to implement 2040 electric bus mandate.
 - Zac: Sen. Padilla is committed to transit and supports innovative transportation tech; he noted that the Senate Environment & Public Works (EPW) committee wants to move "full steam ahead" on the reauthorization bill next week.
- Sen. Dianne Feinstein: staff Rishi Sahgal, Legislative Assistant
 - As this meeting was rescheduled, only 20 of the original 60 registrants attended. APTAdesignated leads on the discussion were Derek Maunus (Gillig) and Charles Stone (SamTrans).
 - Similar points made as in Padilla mtg, focused on jobs, climate, and equity. Charles thanked the Senator for her work in ensuring Caltrain electrification got its new starts funds during the Trump administration.
 - Rishi: Sen. Feinstein met with President Biden and Senator Schumer an hour ago to discuss reauthorization; Sen. Feinstein supports Sen. Padilla's efforts for electric bus funds.









Rail Ridership
